

## St John Fisher CVA – PUPIL PREMIUM WEBSITE STATEMENT

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools for children who are currently known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM), those known to have been eligible in the last six years, children of service families and children who are or who have been in local authority care. It was introduced in April 2011 and is intended to narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers. In the **2019 to 2020** financial year, schools receive the following funding for each child registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years:

- £1 320 for pupils in reception year to year 6
- Schools also receive £2300 for each pupil who has left local-authority care because of 1 of the following:
  - Adoption, a special guardianship order, a child arrangements order, a residence order
  - Children who have been in local-authority care for one day or more also attract £2300 of pupil premium funding. Funding for these pupils doesn't go to their school; it goes to the virtual school head (VSH) in the local authority that looks after the child. VSHs are responsible for managing pupil premium funding for looked-after children.
- Schools receive £300 for children recorded as service children from the Ministry of Defence.

Our total funding through the Pupil Premium for the financial year 2018-19 was 10220. We will use the funding to provide one-to-one or small group tuition by a qualified teacher, to provide additional teaching assistant or tutor support and to support qualifying families with the purchase of uniforms, school site childcare, enrichment and residential opportunities. We invest our funding primarily into quality first teaching as evidence shows this has the greatest impact on outcomes for children.

Currently, the majority of pupils attending St John Fisher who are entitled to the Pupil Premium are working in line with age related expectations (ARE) in the core areas of reading, writing, communication and mathematics. Where they are not, it is usually related to special educational needs. Additionally, the vast majority continue to make at least expected progress from their starting points. The funding last year totaled **£10220**. This was spent as follows:

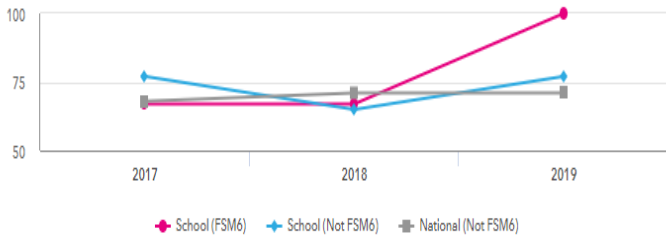

Emotional literacy support was key to enabling specific children to be in a position to access the curriculum and learn, making small steps progress.

The table below shows the comparative progress by children entitled to the pupil premium against their peers during the academic year 2018-19. Due to low numbers of entitlement to pupil premium funding, information is kept to a minimum to avoid identification of children.
