Year 1 staff

- The school website has a page just for children new to year 1.
- All children will have an All About Me booklet to complete.



Aims

Our aims are for all children to:

- Experience a smooth transition
- Enjoy Year 1.
- Learn through a more formal curriculum.
- For parents to feel confident about their child in school



Aims of Transition

Children will adapt:

- Change of curriculum style
- Level of independence required
- Balance between 'work' and 'play'



What will happen?

Autumn term

- Introduction to a more formal aspect of learning but with some time to play on some afternoons to begin with.
- Teachers to establish rules and routines, many of which will be similar to those already experienced but with a greater expectation of independence with work and equipment.



Keeping in Touch

- Parent pocket planners
- Home School link books
- Phonic books
- Reading records
- Website
- Teachers available before and after school
- Parent Readers once a week



Things to Remember

- Encourage your child to become more independent
- Make sure that PE kits are in school every day (if possible in a drawstring bag)
- Check book bags every day for letters and notes home.
- Bring reading books in <u>every</u> day
- Coats for going outside
- Labels in all clothes (please!)
- Homework is completed and is returned on time.



Summary

While we recognise that Key Stage 1 and the National Curriculum is different to the Early Years Foundation Stage, what is important to remember is that it is not too different too quickly!

However, as we work to ensure a smooth and successful transition that provides continuity and consistency between the key stages, we must also make certain that there is progression.

- May/June-Statutory phonics check that all Year 1 children across the country take part in.
- It checks children's independent ability to read a word by blending the sounds within it.
- It contains a selection of real words and nonsense words.



How to help at home

- Be positive about the change
- Try to see things from their point of view
- Listen to your child
- Keep us informed-speak/inform either teacher.
 We will be communicating with each other. All information is confidential.
- Read, encourage and practice writing and do number work with your child to share in their learning and ensure their learning is secure.
